Assignment of the Well-known Bicycle Firm — Liabilities and Assets Not Known Yet.

Company, 17-21 Temperance street, the oldest manufacturers of bicycles Canada, assigned to Mr. J. P. Lang-The firm has been in trouble for ley. a few months back and on account of the delay in the opening of the bicycle season it was unable to meet the payments coming due at the end of the The failure was largely due month. to the intense competition which has been a feature of this ilne of business during late years, the large firms in the United States having secured a goodly portion of the market for bicycles in this country. The concern has been a paying one until very recently. yet it is impossible to tell what the assets and liabilities are. The assignee was only given control on Saturday afternoon, and it will be a week or ten days yet before any kind of definite statement can be made in that regard. The creditors are mostly United States and foreign firms, although a few Canadian houses are slightly interested. A meeting of creditors will be held short-

The Comet Cycle Company were, as stated above, the first firm in Canads to begin the manufacture of bicycles. It was about sixteen years ago that Messrs. Thomas Fane and Charles F. Lavender, the present owners, commenced the business under the name T. Fane & Company, and it has continued since that time, the firm nameling changed in 1891 to the Come Cycle Company. For a number of year the place of business was on Adelaid street har from the property of the growth of trade necessitated larger quarters and a fine five-story factory was erected on the south side of Temperance street in 1895. The company was incorporated in 1897.

It is a matter of conjecture as to what condition the estate is in, but it is hoped that there will be a surplus. Every effort will be made by the firm to meet all obligations so that the business may be continued.
