

\$100,000 BANK ACCOUNT BIG HAUL TO HOMEBREDS KINGARVIE MAY REACH IT

 Kingarvie's victory in the Gen. B. Foley purse, headline event of the King's Birthday program at Thorncliffe, brings to mind that no Canadian-bred ever has won \$100,000.
 In light of Citation's nearing the million-mark, this could tend to give us an inferiority complex. Certainly, some nasty-minded folk might step up and remark that we can't be improving the breed at too rapid a clip. Folks are like that, you know.
 In reality, these matters aren't as bad as they appear. Considering the pots Canadian home-breds are confined to, unless they wish to run for exercise, the only way to arrive at the \$100,000 size is a buck at a time.

Kingarvie Could Do
 Just at this time, Kingarvie is our only hope. He picked up \$370 yesterday when Johnny Dewhurst booted him into a final surge that carried him to a half-length triumph over Lou Silvestri's Flated, and that enabled the eight-year-old, Teal Wrack-Forswear gelding to trounce over the \$90,000 obstacle—in actual figures, \$90,530.
 Since Kingarvie "ain't" what he used to be—he picked up \$4,500 horses at best yesterday—the only way he'll get to the century is—a buck at a time.
 The only other native steed close to that level is E. P. Taylor's Windflies, with \$45,000. But the rapid son of Buntie Lawless has been retired to stud. So if we're going to get there at all we'll have to look to the younger fry. McGill has a fine start. He picked up \$17,620 last year, and about \$14,000 in the King's Plate.
 Only trouble is, his best pots are behind him, as far as the home-bred field is concerned—the Cup and Sauer and the Plate. From here in, there are no double-figured prizes in that category. Nor in any other category in this country.
 On the other side, he has lots to shout about, but what? He has trouble enough last year in \$3,500 company, across the line. Not even his enthusiastic owner, Vince Sheridan, can picture McGill tackling the tough guys on the other side.

Allment Stopped Him
 Early last year, there was a chance that a Canadian-bred would hit a few spots—Canada's Teddy. After sweeping all before him in '48, Canada's Teddy, also a son of Teddy Wrack, arrived from the farm looking like the proverbial million dollars. Suddenly, he went down with a bowel obstruction, and didn't get to the races. Following at several stages last year he was odds-on to have had it.
 Before Canada's Teddy collapsed, his owner and trainer, Morris Fishman, had high hopes of taking the colt across the line and showing at some high spots. Might have done okay, too. Canada's Teddy is back in training, and from his mile in 42 recently isn't too far from the races. But at six and with the terrible time he's had, one can hardly look for him to take on any tough kids.

Double For Brent
 Kingarvie's victory gave trainer Arthur Brent and the Parkwood barn, also Jockey Johnny Dewhurst, a double. They have previously scored with Corwynt in the baby race. Corwynt is by Teddy Wrack out of Gracious Miss, sired by Stand Pat.
 Pat Remillard and Apprentice Wankmuller also produced doubles.

SILVERTS, MILWAUKEE IN JUNIOR TRIUMPHS

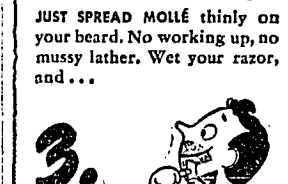
